





ENGLISH DEPARTMENT END OF YEAR REPORT 2015-2016

I. Curriculum changes, new programs, etc.

The implementation of the English Language Arts for the Common Core has been in full swing this year. English teachers have taken the four modules and applied them to their individual grade level curriculum. Mr. Rabideau used bits and pieces of the modules in conjunction with selections from the Prentice Hall edition of the Common Core textbook. Using copies of excerpts from the selections imbedded in the modules, Mr. Rabideau once again required the students to continue doing a monthly independent reading assignment and worked with Melissa Starks to redesign a research module that was created in the OFA Library.

Mrs. Hopkins taught: Read 180 and AIS 7th grade. She also taught a Global 10 C class again with Mr. Kirkpatrick as a CNT resource teacher, and a Global 9C class again, with Mr. Tessmer, as a CNT resource teacher. In addition, Mrs. Hopkins had three sections of 7th grade, one of which met daily and the other two which met every other day. Mrs. Hopkins also had 3 sections of 8th grade Read 180, meeting every other day.

Mrs. Martin would add for grades 7/8 that they completed Assessment tasks throughout the school year by giving STAR Tests and DRA tests three times throughout the year (fall, winter, and spring.) Mrs. Martin used these to track student progress. She then incorporated student assessments to check for mastery of concepts and learning goals, and she designed student learning to improve reading/English skills.

Mrs. Billings, Mr. Dinneen, and Mrs. Manke prepared all juniors to take the Common Core English Regents in January and many performed well on the exam. (This student cohort is required to take the Common Core Exam as the former Comprehensive English Exam has been phased out.) All students who scored 90 or higher were exempt from retaking the exam in June. All others took the exam again to raise their score.

Mrs. Manke had the pleasure of teaching English 12AP English Literature and Composition via a Distance Learning class this year. Students from OFA, Heuvelton, and Harrisville participated in this session from 4 different sites. (One student from Harrisville was involved in the Allied Health program at Southwest Tech BOCES, so a separate station was set up to include this young lady.) The year was full of learning curves, flexibility, and creating a new system for teaching. It is trickier to move teaching materials to another classroom as well as share/assess work when you are not physically in the room with all students. Another challenge was to create new ways of peer collaboration, particularly when one student was situated in a lab by herself. Mrs. Manke learned to use Google Classroom to disseminate and collect materials and assessments. Faxing and using the van mail were other options, but there were often glitches and delays. Materials had to be planned, prepared and sent out two weeks ahead of time in order to deliver them to the outlying school districts via van mail. Once the students and Mrs. Manke were set up in Google Classroom, life became a bit easier for all. Steve Fenton at BOCES immediately took care of technology in the Distance Learning classroom and was consistently helpful with troubleshooting throughout the year if a technology issue arose. The Heuvelton and Harrisville Guidance offices were amazing collaborative partners in this new venture and expressed appreciation that their smaller schools were able to expose students to a new face, new program, and new ideas. The benefit for the students: Lack of familiarity with each other which created more "competition" and appreciation of new ideas. Students enjoyed the camaraderie of new classmates and embraced sharing suggestions and different perspectives. Mrs. Manke felt it was an amazing opportunity to experience Distance Learning during her teaching career at OFA. It was a challenge to address every student's needs in a nontraditional setting, yet it was so very rewarding.

II. Special events, projects, interdisciplinary activities, etc.

The aforementioned research module that Mr. Rabideau required of his English 10 students enabled them to utilize the resources of the library to complete four distinct projects: an historical figure, an author, an historical event, and an area of entertainment. All four projects became part of their third marking period average for English 10.

III. Student activities and achievements.

Students were exposed to two new websites as part of the English 10 curriculum. The TED Talks and NEWSELA websites enabled the students to read, to view, and to listen to various nonfiction articles and presentations on a variety of topics.

Forty three students performed in "A Night at the Cabaret" that was sponsored by the OFA Drama Club and OFA Music Department. Mr. Rabideau and Mrs. Pabis were co-directors of the event that was held on March 4-5, 2016. 394 people attended the two performances, and the cast and crew netted \$2378.00 at the box office.

IV. Field trips, guest speakers, community involvement.

Members of the Drama Club had the opportunity to visit a series of venues relating to the dramatic arts. Students visited St. Lawrence University to see a traveling company's production of *Julius Caesar* in October 2015. The students also went to the St. John's Conservatory Theater's presentation of *A Christmas Carol* in December 2015. The students also had the chance to go to Syracuse, New York to see national tours of *To Kill a Mockingbird* and *Phantom of the Opera* during the months of March and April 2016. Finally, the group participated in a series of afterschool workshops relating to reader's theatre, improvisation, and interactive theater. Plans for class trips and two productions (one musical and one non-musical) are already in the planning stages for the fall.

This year Mrs. Hopkins led OFA's largest group ever of 8th and 9th graders to Washington DC. She brought 70 people, including students, staff, and parents. It was an excellent hands-on history experience as always.

Students participated in the Domiciles Project and worked with Mr. Alan Tuttle in the classroom and in the James Montpelier Art Gallery in May 2016.

Mr. Rabideau continued to be involved in the community as the District 26 Representative for Al-Anon. His participation in this family group initiative involves other groups in Canton, Potsdam, Massena, Hogansburg, Brushton, and Ogdensburg.

V. Professional growth, (staff development, graduate courses, workshops, conferences department initiatives, clubs, organizations, etc.)
The department has met regularly to discuss departmental concerns. Mr. Rabideau also advised the Drama Club in a variety of activities this year. Mr. Rabideau also participated in two book review sessions for the 2015-2016 school year. All of the 96 books reviewed for Ogdensburg and Morristown school districts are sent to the schools free of charge.

In addition to the district organized professional development days, Mrs. Hopkins attended two book studies: "Word Nerds" and "17 Things Highly Effective Teachers Do" through BOCES. They were both excellent.

VI. Goals for 2015-2016 - revisited

Melissa Starks reached out to the English teachers for cataloging class sets of module materials. This way everyone in the department would know which sets are stored in whose classroom. The materials are being collected on a schedule that fits everyone's time table so they could be cataloged, bar coded, and returned to the classroom for student use.

The department discussed various issues relating to the Common Core implementation. There are still concerns relating to time management, curriculum development days, and grading that will be addressed at future meetings.

VII. Goals for 2016-2017

An evaluation of the Common Core modules and their continued inclusion in the OFA ELA curriculum is the foremost concern of the department.





End of the Year Report - Art Department 2015-2016

Curriculum changes, new programs, etc.

Dianne Drayse-Alonso

- Aligned K-12 curriculum with local Art SLOs and LLOs, State and Local Standards, and the Department's Spring Art Exhibit theme, Alternatives.
- Printmaking was successfully added as a high school elective for the first time this year.
 Students excelled in creating artist-prints using a variety of fine art printing techniques including monoprint, linocut, and silkscreen. Prints were exhibited in the Montpelier Gallery, the Remington Art Museum, and the Potsdam Humane Society.
- Independent Study Art enrollment surged at the high school level to accommodate a wide range of student art interests and schedules.
- Supervised student teacher Kylee Disotelle from St. Lawrence University who took on two of my Art 7 classes and two Studio Art classes from February 22 - April 22. Worked closely with Ms. Disotelle to develop meaningful lessons and effective classroom management techniques.

- My first year in the Ogdensburg CSD was enjoyable and productive. I felt very supported by my fellow staff and administrators, and regularly meeting with my mentor Dianne Drayse-Alonso during my free period was invaluable to my success this first year.
- Middle School Art Club was wonderful, and I look forward to being the club advisor again next year. We were involved in multiple projects, including Middle School yearbook design, helping the High School Art Club with the Art Gallery, and designing posters for OFA organizations.

Special events, projects, interdisciplinary activities, etc.

- The James F. Montpelier Gallery hosted the 1st Annual NCATA Art Teacher Show in September 2015. This was a wonderful celebration for area Art Teachers, family, friends and the school communities. - The K-12 Fall Art Exhibit, November 2015, featured the varied work of district Art students. - Ms. Simon collaborated with other subject area educators and librarians on interdisciplinary lessons at the elementary level.

- High School Art Club worked with the OFA Drama Club to paint set pieces for the Cabaret performance.
- We collaborated with artist Alan Tuttle whose Domiciles Project was exhibited for a second time at the James F. Montpelier Gallery, May 18 - 20. Ms. Simon's and Ms. Drayse-Alonso's Art students and Mr. Rabideau's English students worked closely with Mr. Tuttle for two days. Our Studio Art and Sculpture students worked on special projects developed to incorporate this powerful exhibit.

- HS Art Club President Connor Banning's design was chosen for the cover of the CHMC Christmas Card mailed to thousands of potential donors.
- Dana McCormick received the WWNY 7News Arts All-Star award.
- Connor Banning, Dana McCormick, Chelsea Flinn and Kennedy Sloan had artwork accepted and displayed at the Frederic Remington Middle/High School Art Show.
- Maxwell Cameron, a special education student at Kennedy Elementary, had artwork accepted and displayed at the Frederic Remington Elementary Art Show.
- Dana McCormick was the OFA senior showcased in the 2nd Annual K-8 NCATA Regional Art Show at the Canton BOCES with her ceramic "Blobject."
- Artwork by 13 OFA high school students was on display in the High School Art Show at SUNY Potsdam in June.
- Alexia Brouse of Middle School Art Club designed the back cover for the Middle School yearbook.
- HS Art Club painted children's faces for the CHMC Festival of the Trees and for the sophomore class fundraiser, "Parents Night Out," held at OFA.
- Seniors Jo Zhou and Dana McCormick were the recipients of the 2016 OEA Excellence in Visual Art Awards.

- The Spring K-12 Art Show, Alternatives, at the James F. Montpelier Gallery was featured on North Country Public Radio.
- The James F. Montpelier Gallery was featured in the St. Lawrence County Arts Council Quarterly. Over 2,000 copies of their Quarterly is circulated throughout St. Lawrence, Jefferson and Lewis counties.
- OFA Alum and Skidmore College grad, Katie Heiss, presented to the high school Printmaking class, sharing her large-scale figurative prints and processes.
- Sponsored by the St. Lawrence County Arts Council, the James F. Montpelier Gallery participated in a county-wide Gallery Hop that was free and open to the public.

- Middle School and High School Art Clubs, along with the Ceramics and Sculpture
 classes, visited the National Gallery of Canada in Ottawa. This field trip not only exposed
 students to some powerful art, but to another culture as well. Many students have not
 had the opportunity to travel to Canada prior to this trip.
- Sculpture and Ceramics class will visit the Remington Art Museum in June to encounter Remington's sculptures and to learn about the lost wax process.



END OF YEAR REPORT 2015-2016

l. Curriculum changes, new programs, etc.

In conjunction with the newly implemented formative/summative assessment focused grading policy, the Foreign Language department developed a speaking rubric to be used to evaluate student participation across languages and grade levels each marking period. Students self-evaluate, followed by a teacher evaluation.

Throughout the school year *Pam Bice* has been incorporating more Type 1 and 2 writing assignments into her lessons from the Collins Writing Program. Pam's daily bell ringers are always Type 1 or Type 2 writing assignments, in addition to having added Cornell notes to each episode of <u>Destinos</u> (a soap opera viewed by students in Spanish II and III) as a way to describe each new character. Additionally, Pam has attached a card to each student desk. One side has a picture which is used to call on students randomly. The other side has the student learning rubric/scale as a way for students to evaluate themselves more often to see how comfortable they are with the material.

Christina Frank has worked to incorporate close reading activities in the Spanish curriculum at all levels, modeling the implementation of common core standards and teaching approaches across content areas. Christina also welcomed a student teacher during a portion of the spring semester from St. Lawrence University.

Jonathan Lomaki combined upper level French courses to include French IV and V in the same class period. The course content will vary every other year to meet checkpoint C LOTE standards.

II. Special Events, projects, interdisciplinary activities, etc.

Pam Bice added a new unit into the Spanish II curriculum in which students watched the movie, The Book of Life. The movie teaches the meaning behind the holiday, the Day of the Dead. Students completed listening, speaking, reading, and writing activities on this movie. Pam also subscribes to Sr. Wooly's Educational Spanish Website of Music, Videos, and Games. The site has a variety of new features such as nuggets that are broken down into different proficiency levels, "I can" statements, and many more listening, reading, and writing activities.

Christina Frank's Spanish V students provided a cultural celebration for fifth grade students at J.F. Kennedy Elementary school following two weeks of state testing, teaching basic Spanish vocabulary and implementing coordinating activities. Students learned days of the week and months, animals and sounds, and parts of the body in just 90 minutes, proving the best way to show you understand a concept is to demonstrate your ability to teach others.

Jonathan Lomaki created a new project called "the ideal school," in which students designed and presented their own ideal school in French.

III. Student activities and achievements.

All 74 of *Pam Bice's* Spanish 8/1 students (who are enrolled in Spanish for the first time) received a score of 85% or higher on their midterm exam for Spanish 8/1 in January 2016. By

the end of Spanish 8/1, students are able to write a 40 word note in Spanish. By the end of Spanish II, students are able to write a 100 word composition in Spanish.

Christina Frank saw four students enroll in a college credit bearing program through St. Lawrence University, earning credit for Intermediate Spanish 104. Two of the students in the course will continue their education at SLU. With respect to the Spanish IV program, fifteen students enrolled in a similar program through the State University of New York at Potsdam to receive credit for Intermediate Spanish 103.

1V. Field trips, guest speakers, community involvement.

As a culminating activity for two holidays, the Spanish 8/1 and II students in *Pam Bice's* classes planned a cultural celebration and prepared authentic foods from Spanish-speaking countries.

Christina Frank's Spanish V students visited the St. Lawrence University campus once each semester to participate in Spanish Immersion Days with students from various North Country school districts, participating in college courses and cultural activities in the target language.

V. Professional Growth (staff development, graduate courses, workshops, conferences, department initiatives, clubs, organizations, etc.)

Pam Bice assisted other teachers during the school day and in after school sessions to add their SLOs and LLOs to eDoctrina, after previously attending turn-key training. Pam also signed up for Summer Tech Camp that is provided by the St. Lawrence-Lewis BOCES Model Schools Program and will take place August 2-5, 2016. Pam Bice is also a member of the National Honor Society Council for the high school.

Christina Frank serves as faculty advisor for the OFA Key Club, advisor for the high school yearbook, and as a member of the scholarship committee.

Jonathan Lomaki joined a French conversation group, as well as subscribing to several online French podcasts to better his language skills and locate authentic materials to be used in the classroom.







2015-2016

I. Curriculum changes, new programs, etc.

During the 2015-2016 school year Mrs. Kathy Swan taught one section of Geometry, one section of Math 10 and a Lab, two sections of Common Core Algebra II, and one section of Algebra II lab. Mrs. Patricia McCormick taught two sections of Math 9 and Lab, two sections of Math 9C, one section of Algebra AIS, and one section of Regents Review. Mrs. Renee Barr taught two sections of Math 10 with a lab, one section of Geometry, one section of Math 9C Algebra and one section of 10C Algebra. Mr. Matt Snyder taught two sections of Math 9 and Lab. Mrs. Juliette Ross taught two sections of Pre-Calculus, one section of AP Calculus AB, four sections of Algebra II Common Core Lab, and one section of Algebra II Common Core. She also taught AP Calculus AB as a distance learning class to Morristown students. We also offered Statistics by utilizing a cross over teacher Mr. Jacob Jeneault. Once again our students are able to get college credit in Pre-Calculus, Calculus, and Statistics through a program with Paul Smiths College for only \$20 a credit hour.

Mrs.Ross and Mrs. Swan have worked closely together to write the curriculum for the Common Core Algebra II class. They have been using a modified version of the Emathinstruction workbook by Kirk Wieler. Mrs. Barr and Mrs. Swan have worked closely together to re-write the curriculum for the Common Core Geometry class. Their adjustments were made based on the shared collaboration with colleagues from other districts at the workshops they have attended this year. The also made adjustments based on the results of the past three Common Core Geometry Regents Exams. Mrs. McCormick worked with Renee Barr to revamp notes, homework, quizzes, smart notes, and tests that aligned with the Common Core New York State Standards for the new Algebra Common Core using the Emathinstruction workbook by Kirk Wieler that would suit the needs of the Math 9 and 9C students.

Mrs. McCormick and Mrs. Barr also worked closely with Special Education teacher Mrs. Beth Bresett on our 9c and 10c classes, creating homework, notes, quizzes and tests and will continue to make modifications on these next year that reflect the students' needs that have an IEP.

Mr. Snyder used the lessons created by the mathematics department, and modified materials so that fewer examples were projected on the smart board at a time to reflect his style of teaching. His students were taught how to use math print software to make equations in their calculators look like the equations on their paper. For instance, using the fraction builder, or the absolute value brackets.

II. Special events, projects, interdisciplinary activities, etc.

Throughout the year, the members of the Mathematics department implemented the use of the graphing calculator and TI – Smart View Calculator on a daily basis. As we work further with the common core curriculum, we have encouraged students to use the graphing calculators more. There have been many new programs and applications that are required of our students in each of the mathematics courses. We are very grateful that our district has chosen to support our curriculums with the necessary equipment that allows our students use the TI-84plus calculators in our classrooms and at home.

Students in the various mathematics courses were taught how to use mathprint functions such as fractions, summation, logbase. They graphed lines, parabolas, exponentials, absolute value functions, logarithmic functions, trigonometric functions, and higher degree polynomial functions. They also found linear, exponential, quadratic, logarithmic, and sinusoidal regression equations. Students were taught how to create scatter plots, box plots, and find several measures of dispersion, intersection points of systems of equations, and how to use the application inequalities.

Students were encouraged to use the graphing calculator on a daily basis so that they would become proficient using it and to be able to remember how to use it when they take the regents in June.

Mrs. Barr has also continued to use the smart board and allow students to demonstrate the answers to questions on the smart board to their fellow students. This year her students have been very busy using vocabulary strategies, creating vocabulary cards, word walls.

III. Student activities and achievements.

Our math team consisting of Matthew Ramm, Yazhou Zhou, Hayley Snodgrass, Margaret Peo, and Justyn McCormick, under the advisement of Mrs. Juliette Ross attended The Pi Mu Epsilon Mathematics Contest at St. Lawrence University. We are happy and proud to report that Ogdensburg Free Academy won 1st place this year, with 15 schools competing. Matt Ramm was the gold medal finalist for a second year and won scholarship money to the university. Mr. Snyder's student, Cameron Anderson was awarded student of the month in recognition of his achievement in Math 9.

IV. Field trips, guest speakers, community involvement.

Mrs. Ross took five students to the Pi Mu Epsilon Mathematics Contest at St. Lawrence University.

V. Professional growth, (staff development, graduate courses, workshops, conference department initiatives, clubs, organizations, etc.)

Mrs. Swan has been a member and will continue next year on the District Action Committee. She is a member of the District Teacher Leadership Committee and has attended many workshops that have led to turnkey training for our department in implementing the new Common Core Standards. For the district Mrs. Swan has also completed her 12th year as Extra Curricular Activities Treasurer. Mrs. McCormick is on the National Honor Society Induction Committee and the Response to Intervention Committee. The mathematics department has also attended the following workshops, Living Above and Below the Line: Discovering the Power of Choice, Learned Helplessness, Your Right to Know/DASA, Prioritizing, and Mapping Math Curriculum.

Mrs. Barr attended the TEQ Online Technology PD Training. Mrs. Barr and Mrs. Swan attended the Geometry Teacher to Teacher Work Day over the summer. Mrs. Swan and Mrs. Ross attended the Algebra II 3 day workshop over the summer. Mrs. Ross attended the two day Google Summit in Ottawa. Mr. Snyder attended the workshops, Understanding and Dealing with Challenging Students and Effective Teaching Five Day Workshop.

VI. Goals for 2015-2016 - revisited

Mrs. McCormick did not create a web page so that she can have links for notes and homework for students to go to when they are absent or have forgotten their notes at school but plans to try again next year.

Mrs. Barr has met most of her goals that she set for herself last year. She created notes, homework, quizzes and tests for the new common core Geometry curriculum. Also teaching Math 9C and 10c for the first time, she created new notes homework and tests and quizzes. She will also continue to adjust and create new review notes for her Geometry classes.

Mrs. Swan has met her goals of preparing to teach two new preps: Common Core Geometry and Common Core Algebra II. She worked with Mrs. Barr in rewriting the materials for the Common Core Geometry. This restructure was based on the results of the June and August regents. Mrs. Swan also worked with Mrs. Ross to create materials needed for the new Common Core Algebra II. Mrs. Swan continued to write TCM's for Geometry and begin the process for Algebra II.

Mrs. Ross met her goal to continue to make adjustments in Pre-Calculus and Calculus to prepare for common core modifications in those courses that will be fully initiated one year from now. She also worked closely with Mrs. Swan on the curriculum changes for a Common Core Algebra II course she taught this year.

This was Mr. Snyder's first year at OFA.

IV. Goals for 2016-2017

Mrs. Swan's goals for the 2016-2017 school year will be to work with Mrs. Barr in making adjustments to the materials for the Common Core Geometry. This restructure will be based on the results of the June and August regents. She also plans to work with Mrs. Ross in rewriting the materials for the Common Core Algebra II. This restructure will be based on the results of the June and August regents. Mrs. Swan plans to continue to write TCM's for Geometry and begin the process for Algebra II.

Mrs. McCormick would like to take more time to contact parents and keep the lines of communication open. Not only is it important to contact parents regarding bad news, it is even as important to give good news. Mrs. McCormick hopes to also create a web page for notes and homework for students to go to when they are absent or have forgotten their notes at school.

Mr. Snyder's goals for the next year are to establish clearer expectations for students and to become more familiar with the operation of the TI-84 and TI-Nspire Graphing calculators.

Mrs. Barr's goals for next year are to continue using many of the new strategies she has learned over the past few years such as Bell Ringers, posting agenda and objectives, nontraditional seating arrangement, and vocabulary strategies and activities. Also, she would like to continue to work on the new common core Geometry curriculum and adjust her lessons. She plans to continue to make modifications to the 9C and 10c curriculum.

Mrs. Ross plans to modify the Pre-Calculus curriculum to reflect what students have learned in the common core curriculum. Since the AP Calculus curriculum is changing next year, she plans to work over the summer to make adjustments necessary this coming fall. She will also need to submit a new syllabus which reflects additions to the curriculum to be AP certified. Mrs. Ross also plans to continue posting to her webpages for her different courses so that students can keep current in courses when absent.

I. Curriculum changes, new programs, etc.

We, once again, spent several hours developing the curriculum, modifying notes (following Cornell Note-Taking), homework assignments and tests based on the common core modules. We incorporated some of the State Exam Released Questions into our notes and homework.

We continue to incorporate technology into our classes by using graphing calculators, the smart board (recording lessons when we are absent), and the ELMO.

We continue to use and improve our websites that are linked to OFA's webpage for student use. Their classroom notes were available throughout websites to keep parents and students informed.

We continue to give the STAR Math Assessment three times a year as another measure of growth for our students.

We continue to include Collins Writing into our curriculum through our notes and homework assignments.

We continue to use PBIS classroom procedures and rewards.

We have our students rate their level of understanding based on a 4 point rubric.

We consistently maintain parent contact through progress reports, emails, and phone calls.

Our department had a successful year working with our Consultant Teachers, Cassandra LaRock and Hillary Skelly. Many regular education students, as well, benefited from the fact that they had two teachers in the classroom to help out with any difficulties that they were having. We also attended CSE meetings.


We were very successful with our Grade 7a math curriculum this year. We were able to get further into the Grade 8 curriculum than last year.

VII. Goals for 2016-2017



7-12 Music Department End of Year Report 2015-2016

7-12 Vocal Music, Submitted by Sara Pabis

- Choral students in both groups were introduced to singing in foreign languages.
 7-8 chorus learned a song from Ghana, and 9-12 sang both in Swahili and Croatian.
- In lessons, high school students learned to sight read using solfege. Students also learned to sing an Italian Aria in lessons.
- The winter concert was a success for all students involved. Middle school
 Chorus, High School Chorus and Jazz Rock performed a variety of genres
 memorized, in the new auditorium. Middle School chorus sang a song from
 Ghana. High School chorus sang a piece with part of it in Croatian. Students
 also learned how to interact with the new audio system and microphones while
 rehearsing in this space.
- Jazz Rock Ensemble also performed their winter concert program at Kennedy Elementary and Madill Elementary Schools.
- Twenty five students performed a 25 minute set for FNSUR NYSUT Retirees luncheon meeting.
- One student participated in Zone V NYSSMA Area-All State this past November at Indian River School District.
- Twelve High School students participated in the All county High School Chorus, and eleven Middle School students participated in Middle School All County Chorus.
- Fourteen students auditioned, and two High School chorus members were accepted to SLCMEA's select a capella ensemble and performed at All County Festival B at OFA.
- Six vocal students attended the NYSSMA solo festival and performed in Italian.
 Three High School students performed a level 6 and earned a 95 or above. A seventh grade student performed a level 4 and earned a perfect score of 28!

(Continued:)

- Throughout the school year select Jazz Rock members performed the National Anthem and varied repertoire at the George Hall Auditorium Grand Opening, the Winter Pep Rally, the OFA Cheerleading Competition, Expo, and the Law Enforcement Torch Run.
- For the spring concert, middle school students were able to focus on creating more harmonies and focus on their musicality. High school students sang very different genres, including a gospel song in Swahili, a pop song, and a musical medley.
- New this year, 7-12th grade students were able to audition for OFA's musical production, "A Night at the Cabaret". 38 students performed in the new auditorium in March, showcasing 14 musical numbers from 11 different musicals. Students had the opportunity to be in the cast of the show, or assist with sound and lighting.
- Next year, we will be adding a "Theater Tech" class for 9-12th grade students.
 Students in this class will learn basic acting techniques, how to use the light board and create a show, how to run the soundboard and microphones, go from sketch to production to create sets and props, writing a playbill, advertise/publicize events, and stage makeup and costume coordination, with the end goal of producing the school's musical.

7/8 General Music - Submitted by Richard Patton

- Students were introduced to percussion, dulcimer, guitar and keyboard units. Each unit ended with a proficiency exam consisting of a one to two minute piece that they had to perform by themselves.
- Work is being done to create handbooks for each unit to help students have the materials more available to work at their own pace and also outside of school.
- The music department was granted three rooms to allow for the future creation of a main general music classroom in room 240, a guitar lab in room 241 and a piano lab in room 242. The guitar and piano labs will allow opportunities for all students and all music faculty to have readily available and fully furnished instrumental classrooms to use.

7/8 Instrumental Music (Band) Submitted by Richard Patton

- The music software *Finale* was purchased to allow all music teachers in the district the ability to create or re-write music, as well as to create supplements in ensembles and lessons.
- The Winter concert went quite well. This was the first concert in the newly renovated auditorium for both the seventh grade students and myself.
- Seven students participated in the Junior-High All-County Band which I had the pleasure to guest conduct for SLCMEA.
- Fifteen students participated in the Spring NYSSMA Solo Festival. One seventh
 grade student achieved a perfect score and six other students scored within
 three points of perfect.
- All performance areas (band room, chorus room and room 113) were fitted with audio mixers and recording microphones, which the district already owned, to allow for recording of soloists and large groups. This provides immediate feedback for students to listen to themselves and also allows them to send the audio home to their parents or guardians.
- The Spring concert is shaping up to have more challenges pieces for the students to perform, pushing them to grow from their previous abilities demonstrated during the Winter concert.
- Student handbooks are being created for each student, based on the instrument
 that they play. Each handbook will contain pedagogical information, helpful
 resources, exercises and scores of pop, holiday, patriotic and Americana pieces
 that will be used to help teach throughout the future. This extensive undertaking
 is expected to have basic functionality by September, but will continue to be built

into the 2016-17 school year. This will be a goal of mine in 2016-17 to complete each handbook.

Work is being done to align the middle school band curriculum to be a more
efficient stepping stone from the elementary program into the high school. My
music colleagues and I are working to unify our teaching vocabulary and
techniques to create a more consistent environment for our students from one
level to another. The same work is being done with the chorus teacher to help us
use more consistent vocabulary and teaching tools for our students that are in
both band and chorus.


9-12 Instrumental Music (Band) Submitted by Jon Cole

- A new Pops Ensemble comprised of 18 students, predominantly 9" and 12" graders was established for the school year. It utilized a population available during an 8" period study hall. It was a great group of students who were consistently ready. The hope is to explore opportunities like these, year to year, as the schedule allows.
- A small population of 7 students, who were scheduled for a study hall period 3, were invited to start a Dixie Jazz Ensemble. It has been a great exploration of the style and the students have worked hard at playing as a well-balanced ensemble. This was a great opportunity for some very motivated students.
- A saxophone quartet was formed for the year. For these students, it was an opportunity to explore styles and genre's using the color tone of the saxophone family. It was great fun, an excellent challenge, and students really enjoyed exploring the soprano, alto, tenor, and baritone saxophone.
- The first Winter Concert was held in the newly renovated auditorium. The space is awesome and slowly the comfort level with the lighting and sound technology is improving. The logistics of performances will improve so that flow between band ensembles will be smoother.
- For 2015-16, 6 Students represented OFA when they participated in the NYSSMA Zone V, VI Area All-state held at Indian River Central School in November.
- OFA, once again hosted the SLCMEA All-County B Festival. Ten, 9-12 HS Students, participated in the festival and it was a great musical experience for all.
- One student was selected, after auditioning in November, as lead alto saxophone
 in the SLCMEA All-County A Festival, at the Crane School of Music. As well,
 Mr. Cole was the Junior High All-County Band Chairperson for SLCMEA and Mr.
 Patton was invited to conduct the 100 student ensemble.
- Jazz Band was again larger this school year with 34 students. In a legitimate
 jazz environment this is not a typical jazz band but when you are talking a public
 school and students, the large number of interested and available students is
 outstanding. It is my intent to look for opportunities to request jazz band be
 placed in the master schedule in the future. I think this would improve the
 group's overall quality but currently I'm extremely pleased with the student
 interest.

- Fourteen Grade 9-12 students participated in the NYSSMA Solo Festival. This
 year students actively interacted with Smart Music software to assist their solo
 preparation. Two juniors performed at the All-State Level both scoring 99 out of
 100!
- The SLO and LLO initiatives for 2015-16 were again utilized and integrated into the curriculum. Thank you to the district for allowing a performance class, like band and chorus, to provide a performance assessment rather than a regional written exam pertaining to non-performance related content. Although the process is intended for teacher evaluation, the process implemented provided sound feedback to students.
- Again this spring the H.S. Concert Band and the Color Guard will support area
 organizations during their annual remembrance events. The OFA band will
 participate in the City's Memorial Day Parade and Ceremony in the cemetery, the
 Elk's Flag Day Ceremony at the park, as well; students have volunteered their
 time to play taps at the Blessing of the Boats and at the Flag retiring ceremony.
- Expo 2016! With the options of this year's new ensembles, the Pops Band, Sax Quartet, Jazz Band, Dixie Jazz Group, and the McNally and Friends band helped provide entertainment for this year's Expo sponsored by the Boys and Girls Club. It was great that students were able to participate this year. It was a nice highlight for them and it was great to support the Expo.
- The Spring Concert was a culmination of a big year and was a great celebration for all, especially, the 25 band seniors who have led us all year long.
- one of our best seasons and the students were very proud of themselves. The show was well received by all and the corps did very well in competition. It was a great summer for the OFA Marching Blue Devils. This season was condensed with all the marching events occurring in the month of July and in my survey of parents, fans, and students it was the best schedule yet! Students were able to schedule sports camps early in August and the student conflicts were minimized! As well, the parent group was ready and present, helping support the Marching Unit. They certainly help keep the band rolling on those hot days and their help is totally appreciated! The current community/parent group is wonderful at supporting the Corps' goals but they also understand when to step back and allow the directors, student leaders, and student members the room to self-manage. Health End of Year Report 2016-2017

Health is always evolving as information changes. I try to keep up with the current trends and information so that I can then pass that information on to my students.

I added 2 new guest speakers to my list of presenters. Kelly Johnson-Eilola is a Teens HELP Coordinator. Teens HELP is a project of the Health Initiative and is a NYSDOH funded program to reduce the challenges of teen pregnancy in St. Lawrence County. She provided our students with sexuality education as well as adult preparation skills in areas of healthy relationships, health care literacy and respecting sexual consent.

The second speaker was Jack Vielhauer. His presentation was about bullying as it relates to awareness and acceptance of LGBT. It focused on defining terms and using appropriate language. Students also worked in small groups and discussed current real life situations. His presentations was part of his Gender Studies class and is part of the NYS S.A.F.E. Grant.

Danielle Egan, Jack's Gender Studies Professor, came to our staff meeting to educate our teachers and administrators about these topics.

For professional growth, I am a member of the Wellness Committee. We have made positive changes to our District Wellness Policy and have put healthy, positive initiatives in place. Some examples include: a celebration cart to encourage healthy, fun celebrations with smoothies and food tasting, encouragement of daily recess for the elementary grades, and healthy fund raising for our district. We were awarded money to accomplish some initiatives and to buy athletic equipment to make physical education more fun for everyone.


In the fall, I attended a workshop about transgender. Presenters gave information about what life as a transgender is like and what we can do to accommodate their needs.

7th& 8^{th grade} Science END OF YEAR REPORT- 2015-2016

I. Curriculum changes, new programs, etc.

We are all continuing to integrate ELA Common Core Reading strategies into the 7th grade Physical Science and 8th grade Life Science Curriculum.

II. Special events, projects, interdisciplinary activities, etc.

- 1. Cell Project- Build a model of a Plant or animal cell 8th grade Life Science
- 2. Students in Ms. Lockwood's 7th grade classes built "Egg Cars". They had to incorporate restraints and shock absorbers to protect the egg when their car traveled down a ramp and hit a cement block. This project encompassed Newton's Laws of Motion. Students kept a weekly journal white building their cars.
- 3. Adopt an Element Project- 7th grade students were assigned an element and did research to then be able to advertise their element. They created posters to advertise the element and filled out information sheets on their element.

END OF YEAR REPORT HS Science 2015-2016

I. Curriculum changes, new programs, etc.

Amber Henry continues to use daily bell ringers, castle learning and demonstrations in her classes and this year began using Plickers for review in Earth Science. Amber has also started using more real world current events to help explain Earth Science concepts.

There were no changes in Living Environment or Applied Living Environment in Metza Hewko's classroom.

Jamie Lopez continues to add new bell ringers daily/weekly that challenge student's skills in reading, writing, and practicing their science vocabulary. She tries to add current topics for bell ringer discussions (health and science related).

Kevin Ross developed new labs for his Applied Chemistry class.

Matt Shaver has added new reading portions of the Regents Chemistry course to align with the new core curriculum.

Cristy Smith incorporated Plickers into the classroom routine for all classes, as well and added 13 PhET Interactive Simulation labs to the Physics lab manual, and created some new effective teaching activities/demos.

- II. Special events, projects, interdisciplinary activities, etc. Amber Henry attended several Earth Science PLT's, coached the Science Olympiad team, chaperoned a trip to Washington, D.C. and meet with Master teachers for monthly cohort meeting to discuss common core changes.
 Students in Mrs. Hewko's Applied Living Environment grew marigolds during their plant unit. As the students covered the skeletal system, they dissected owl pellets, located and identified bones, and determined the species that had been eaten. The bones were then glued onto flat cardboard in the appropriate arrangement, to show the skeleton of the owl's prey.
- III. Student activities and achievements.

Jamie Lopez nominated a student for OFA student of the month because of his outstanding work in science, and he was chosen. Jamie's Advanced Science class has grown in population and is currently at 21.

Kevin Ross is having mandatory and optional review classes after school for students who need extra help in preparing for Chemistry Regents.

The Robotics team, coached by Matt Shaver, took first place at the Clarkson University Robotics Academy Challenge tournament in December.

Cristy Smith's and Amber Henry's Science Olympiad team competed at Clarkson (placed 9th overall, and one student received a medal for placing 2nd for his event).

IV. Field trips, guest speakers, community involvement.

Amber Henry chaperoned a trip to the North Country Food Day. Amber also hosted a foreign exchange student from Austria for the entire school year.

Kevin Ross was the boys' Varsity Basketball bookkeeper and supervised football and basketball games.

The Robotics team, under Matt Shaver's guidance, ran a booth at the Boys and Girls Club Expo and did a demonstration for the local Brownies troop.

Cristy Smith gave a planetarium show to local Cub Scouts, and helped a student receive his Astronomy badge for Boy Scouts.

V. Professional growth, (staff development, graduate courses, workshops, conference department initiatives, clubs, organizations, etc.)

Amber Henry applied for and was accepted into the NYS Master Teacher Program. Amber hosted a student teacher from SLU in the fall. Amber was a trainer for Smart notebook in the fall of 2015. She also participated in a Teacher to Teacher conference, Smartnotebook training along with all of the staff development workshops at our school. Amber was the Earth Club advisor and co advisor of the Science Olympiad team.

Mrs. Hewko attended a meeting with Beverly Ouderkirk, member NYS Board of Regents. Mrs. Ouderkirk discussed issues with state testing and how the state is responding to concerns of parents, teachers, and administrators. The meeting was hosted by the Potsdam chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma, and the local Ogdensburg chapter was also invited.

Jamie Lopez attended all staff development workshops.

Kevin Ross attended staff development / workshop days throughout the year.

Matt Shaver attended all staff development days and a weekend long football conference. Matt coached J.V. Football, Modified Girls Lacrosse and a high school Robotics team. Matt also performed a curriculum review at Northwest Tech, and attained an ETS Recognition of Excellence for a high score on the PRAXIS Chemistry Examination.

Cristy Smith attended STANYS and is an active participant in the Master Teacher Program. She also presented Plickers at a faculty meeting, and is a co-advisor for the Science Olympiad team.

VI. Goals for 2015-2016 – revisited

Jamie Lopez will continue revisions on the current Living Environment lab manuals, review book, and classroom materials to keep up to date with advances/changes in science and the regents.

Students in Mrs. Hewko's have been doing well with Cornell notes and Collins-style vocabulary. Mrs. Hewko found by increasing the amount of reading passages and

related questions appeared to have helped with comprehension skills in the Applied Living Environment class. (Mrs. Hewko's new labs went well and the lab book should be adjusted to include these labs and remain at topic appropriate labs as the year progresses.)

Cristy Smith's PhET labs were a success and she will continue them next year.

Cristy Smith and Amber Henry made changes to the Astronomy Unit for Earth Science which worked out much better than previous years.

VII. Goals for 2016-2017

Amber Henry would like to take a graduate course at SLU over the summer and also begin using TED Ed in the classroom. Amber would also like to continue working with the Science Olympaid team to improve the team's ranking and also begin coaching the Mytholympics team again.



END OF YEAR REPORT OFA Grades 7/8 Social Studies 2015-2016

Department Curricular Highlights:

- Mr. Snyder was reappointed as Social Studies Department Chair for the 2015-2016 school year. He was
 responsible for ordering new materials, master scheduling, and being a liaison for information from the
 administration to the faculty. He held monthly meetings, developed agendas and assisted department
 members with orders and curricula.
- Mr. McRoberts and Mr. Tebo were assigned to 8th grade U.S. History classes. Mr. Tebo also taught the Advanced 8th Grade section.
- Mrs. Johnson, Mr. McRoberts, and Mr. Tebo and have worked to make the transition to the Common Core Curriculum as seamless as possible, with constructed, deep reading activities.
- Mr. McRoberts and Mr. Tebo, after having been involved in County Wide Staff Development in March, have incorporated the Stanford University, "Read Like A Historian Series". This requires students to go through the process of Common Core learning includes, deep reading skills, to gain better understanding of historical concepts.
- Mrs. Johnson taught 7th grade U.S. History classes, as well as, Technology. Her current goals for the students are that they will understand how the industrial revolution caused a major change in all aspects of the U.S. with major ramifications for our people. The technology course provides a way for students to become better versed in the capabilities of programs like MS Office and the World Wide Web.
- On May 20, 2016 all of the 7th graders participated in Fort de La Presentation day. Students completed research prior to the one day activities that took place at the site of the Fort. Students are offered the opportunity to enter a writing contest about 2016 Founders' Day Essay Contest for students in grades 4-12. Students also created posters prior to the activity day at the Fort site.
- Mr. Tebo reports that his classes read <u>One Who Came Back</u> by Anita Mayer. A novel which brought the students up close and personal with the trials and tribulations of those that survived the Holocaust. Ms. Mayer was a frequent visitor to OFA in years past, as she lives in Canada, near the U.S. border.
- Mr. McRoberts classes conducted a research project, with the library, on the Civil War.

Department Special Events, Projects, and Activity Highlights:

- Paul Stillman, presented to all of the eighth grade classes this year as "Byron Scott: Civil War Soldier,"
 which was quite entertaining and gave the student insight to the time period. The presentation was excellent
 and was made possible by a grant from BOCES.
- On May 20, 2016 all of the 7th grade students participated in Fort de La Presentation day. Students completed research prior to the one day activities that took place at the site of the Fort. Students are entered into a writing contest about 2016 Founders' Day that included students in grades 4-12. Students also created posters prior to the activity day at the Fort site. This is a great way to incorporate local history into the 7th grade curriculum. END OF YEAR REPORT OFA High School Social Studies 2015-2016 Department Curricular Highlights:

- Mr. Snyder was reappointed as Social Studies Department Chair for the 2015-2016 school year. He was
 responsible for ordering new materials and being a liaison for information from the administration to the
 faculty. He held monthly meetings, developed agendas and assisted department members with orders and
 curricula.
- Mr. Brady is to be congratulated for many years of service to the Ogdensburg City School district as he has been approved for retirement as of June 30, 2016. He has been on a disability leave since the beginning of the 2nd Semester and replaced by Mr. Michael Anguiano who comes to OFA by way of Thousand Islands Central School. Our department wishes Mr. Brady the best as he embarks on a new chapter in his life.
- Our department continues the instruction of the "C" track classes for Global History and Geography, but
 was discontinued in the case of U.S. History and Government. Ms. Hopkins and Mr. Brady [Mr. Augliano]
 worked closely with the Resource Room teachers to provide tailored instruction. This has been undertaken
 to meet the recommendations set forth by the NYSED consultants to the district including Gerry Swalnick.
- Mr. Snyder's Latin American Studies class studied about and represented Canada this year at the Model Organization of American States Assembly. Mr. Snyder continued to utilize projects and presentations. Mr. Snyder also integrated Cornell Style Notes into his Government 12 and Economics 12 programs. Students really responded to this student driven concept. In Economics he covered a broad range of topics including Market structure, Role of the consumer, Market determinants and Personal Finance. As the economic curriculum has changed to focus more on Personal Finance, he has integrated lessons in order to meet that new focus.
- Mr. Brady [Mr. Augliano] taught the following courses; Global History & Geography 9 and Sociology
 during the first semester and Psychology during the second semester until his departure [see above]. He
 continues to focus on developing student's writing skills through practice.
- Mr. Henry reports that Graduation Standards are being met daily. All notes in classes are done using PowerPoint and SMART Notebook so that students need to process information through listening, reading and viewing. Cornell notes were used this year and were very effective. Collins and Schaffer writing model were also used as more type I writing was done. This year students created PowerPoint Presentations and many used Windows Movie Maker for class presentations. History Alive activities were used throughout the year, meaning students were using a variety of ways to generate knowledge and increase problem solving skills. One major project was completed per marking period in which students had to create a quality product. Group work was done on almost a daily basis by creating newscasts, newspapers and many other activities. He used a bell ringer on a daily basis as well as putting a daily agenda and daily objectives (done midway through the year). Students were also placed in groups of 2 and 3 to work collaboratively, especially during review for the Regents exam. Item analysis of the Regents Exam was undertaken as well. He further reports that due to changes in AP U.S. History exam he made changes to his AP Curriculum. That process was completed in January, approved by College Board, and now he is required to use more primary documents and reading excerpts to prepare to meet the Common Core agenda. He has taken part in various district initiatives to meet this challenge. With these changes, one of his goals is to raise AP scores as well as the mastery level on the NYS USHG Regents Exam
- Ms. Hopkins taught reading as well as teaching one section of Global 9 C, and one section of Global 10C. She comments that she was able to cover a number of topics in both history classes through use of Cornell style notes and to meet the rigor of the Common Core by incorporating test preparation for the Global Studies Regents Exam by using past Regents Exam questions as bell ringers at the beginning of her classes. She incorporated enrichment video clips, hands on activities involving the smart board, partner work, and current events, for public speaking. These techniques kept the class engaged, the rhythm flowing, and allowed the information and teaching style to be varied and yet challenging. A goal she has for next year is to incorporate more technology and hands on activities into her curricula and classroom that focus on solid 21 century skills to help students prepare for college and careers.
- Mr. Price taught AP European History, Global History & Geography 10, and Global History & Geography
 9A, and Global History & Geography Regents Exam Review. He has continued to meet the challenges of

the rigor of the AP Program while creating a feeder program, 9A, for his AP European History Course. He has met the student's needs head on through extensive daily preparation and research. He hopes to be able to attend AP Workshops to fine tune and accentuate his skills for his AP students. Mr. Price also taught sections of Global History & Geography 10 Regents Exam preparation. He continues to be challenged by the teaching of this course, but has risen to the occasion. Mr. Price's position as OEA President has given him insight into the APPR and the Common Core. He is a proponent of Cornell Notes. He has shared his strategies for Common Core Instruction with the department and through BOCES County Wide workshops during the school year. He is an ardent proponent of the use of Common Core instructional strategies in all his classes. He was elected to our local City Council and has used his experience to enhance his classroom activities.


Mr. Tebo continued using Microsoft Power Point to enhance his students understanding of the 10th grade
Global History and Geography curriculum. The use of Power Point has opened up new avenues to him as
another means of evaluating his students. He has also used a program through BOCES where teachers can
download historical video clips and show them in class. This has allowed for further enrichment of the
social studies curriculum.

Department Special Events, Projects, and Activity Highlights:

- Ms. Hopkins was accompanied by Mr. Price on the biennial trip to Washington DC Trip in the Fall of 2015 through the tour company, Worldstrides, for the 8th and 9th grade students. This was the largest group ever, 70 people; including students, staff, and a couple of parents. This was an excellent hands-on history experience for our students. Along with sightseeing, the students met Jon Cardinal, OFA '04, aide to Sen. Gillibrand, for a talk and lesson while in Washington. Two OFA 8th graders were awarded the Gary Goolden Memorial Scholarship which covers a portion of the cost of the trip. The recipients were Jada Smith and Cameryn Anderson.
- Jon Cardinal also was a featured guest speaker to 9-12 students prior to the holiday break. He encouraged students to find mentors and make connections in life in order to reach their full potential.
- In the fall and spring the department conducted a Voter Registration Drive. Students that were of age were assisted in registering to vote in an effort led by Mr. Snyder. Over 100 students were registered. The staff of the St. Lawrence County Board of Elections brought the new automated voting machines into OFA for demonstrations to our students in March. This was a great experience for the students that were newly registered, or were about to be registered, to vote.
- Mr. Snyder's Economics students completed a Stock Market simulation project where they learned to research stocks and buy and sell securities. Mr. Snyder offers an ITunes Gift Cards to the winner of a semester long stock market game.
- Mr. Snyder's senior Government classes tried the case of State of NY v. Kelly Roberts. This was a criminal court proceeding centering on whether evidence obtained in a search by police could be used by the prosecution at trial. These materials are from the NYS Bar Association's Mock Trial Tournament. Students' grade themselves on performance through a series of rubrics.
- Seniors were required to participate in a Senior Service Project. The project involved seniors performing community service and witnessing government in action. The students were required to write about their experiences and prove participation in community service by interacting with local leaders. We are encouraged by the way in which students developed ideas that were not listed as part of our prescribed set of methods to satisfy the project. They took it upon themselves to create innovative ways to meet the standards we set forth. We are hopeful this has encouraged greater community mindedness by the students while allowing them to live up to the NYS Social Studies Learning Standards for citizenship.





This year, this Technology Department has instructed the following classes: Grade 8 Intro. To Technology (3 sections per teacher per day), Wood 1 and II, Metals I and II, DDP, Cad 1 and II. All of our classes are running with very respectable enrollments. The student enthusiasm is very, very high and the projects that students are creating are diverse, complex, and demonstrate technical skills at very high levels. Independent/critical problem solving skills are very good and there are virtually no attendance or discipline issues.


We spend the majority of our time focusing on the class room/lab experiences. Our high school classes are very "Technical Project" oriented.



End of Year Report (2015-2016)

On August 3 and 4 Ogdensburg Free Academy, previously approved and recognized by the New York State Education Department as a NYS Certified Agency, offering courses of study in First Aid and CPR knowledge and skills for coaches (meeting the provisions of Education Law 3001(b)(c) and Regulations of the Commissioner of Education, Section 135.5), was the site of the OFA Athletic Department Coaches' Certification Session. All existing members of the certification/re-certification staff are certified as instructors to teach the NYSED approved First Aid and CPR courses for coaches; and several members of this highly proficient staff assisted with our annual certification session. During this two-day period, many coaches from Ogdensburg and surrounding communities successfully completed the required objectives and skills evaluations, in accordance with the curriculums of the NYSED and the American Heart Association (AHA).

On August 8 Ogdensburg Free Academy, designated as a "Testing Site" for the NYSPHSAA Section 10 Regional Advance Placement Performance Test (previously referred to as the Selection Classification Test), was the host location for the Fall Sports Season Session. The OFA Athletic Department organized, coordinated, and administered this test, with individual student-athletes from several surrounding school districts attending including: Canton, Gouverneur, Harrisville, Lisbon, Madrid-Waddington, St. Lawrence Central, Potsdam, and OFA.

On August 31 and September 1 the OFA Blue Devils Girls Soccer kicked off the Northern Athletic Conference Season by hosting the OFA Girls Soccer Tournament at the Junior Varsity and Varsity levels. The Varsity Tournaments were held on the OFA multipurpose field/turf while the JV Tournaments were held in the Alton W. Elliott Stadium and on the turf. Several local schools participated including: Gouverneur, Heuvelton, Lisbon, Norwood-Norfolk, Salmon River, and OFA.

On September 3 and 5 the OFA Blue Devils Boys Soccer squads hosted the Boys Annual Gerard Cring Memorial Soccer Tournament at the Junior Varsity and Varsity levels. The Varsity Tournaments were held on the OFA multipurpose field/turf while the JV Tournaments were held in the Alton W. Elliott Stadium and on the turf. The 2015-2016 school year for the Liberty Partnerships Program (LPP) at OFA has had considerable amount of accomplishments. Due to increased funding the amount of hours the Liberty Partnerships Coordinator can spend with students has doubled providing more time to support student's academic efforts, assist in pursuing careers and exploring college options.

The most recent accomplishments of an OFA LPP student must be mentioned: Jacy Thompson won a \$1300 scholarship to SUNY Canton during the campus' Engineering Open House. She placed first place in a bridge competition! Daniel Beyette, Brandon Oshier and Chyanne Brown are all participating in an Engineering college course at SUNY Canton, tuition paid by LPP! They are all doing well in the class and the professor is very pleased with their performance. To foster engineering exploration students have also had the opportunity to participate in an Aerospace camp at SUNY Canton free of charge. Students that excelled in that camp will be given the opportunity to participate in a part two this summer. New participants will be invited to take advantage of part one as well.

A newly added feature to the program at OFA this year is the LPP Committee. Committee members have a variety of tasks developed and enhance the program. Committee members meet monthly to discuss ways LPP students can fully benefit from being active program participants. Committee members are also invited to attend the Empire Promise Youth Summit this year in Albany, NY. The summit is designed to expose students to career and college options. In addition to the annual programs our office offers to students and parents including College Application Night for Seniors, The College Fair, SUNY Road Show, Junior Information Night, and Financial Aid Awareness Night, the following activities/events occurred this year:

- All counselors continue to attend workshops on new CDOS and Skills Achievement credentials for graduation. Ms. Lori Montpetit, BOCES supervisor, and Candy Tavernier continue to be very helpful in providing us a template with which to work from. We had 4 students graduate with this credential this year.
- Collaborated with counselors and administrators from NWT and other area counselors in the re-developing a new program known as CREATE which follows the model of the former Multi Occ program offered at NWT. We have 8 students registered for the '16-17 school year.
- Kept abreast of all new Pathways to graduation as they were made available to us from State Ed. This year especially was a very busy year in this regard.
- OFA participated in the Distance Learning network as a provider. We offered classes to students from Heuvelton (3) Harrisville (3) AP English 12, Lisbon (2) AP US History and Morristown (2) AP Calc. We already have students from other districts registered for the '16-17 year.
- Paul Smith's College came to OFA and enrolled students in College courses taught at OFA.
- SUNY Canton came to OFA to assist students with the Freshman enrollment process for their school.
- Identified students for Liberty Partnership Program, Youth Advocate Program and for SLU Buddies.
- Mr. Christy hosted an Intern, Ms. Jen Graveline, a former OFA student, for both the fall and spring semesters.
- All counselors along with OFA staff attended a Staff Development day program "Living Above and Below the line: the Power of Choice" in the fall and another titled "Learned Helplessness", in the spring.
- Guidance Direct college search for all Gr.11 and Gr.12 was completed in preparation for the annual College Fair.
- "Gateways to Careers" was attended again this year by the junior class and Northwest Tech seniors. Ms. McLean and Mrs. Putman again this year, along with the Guidance staff, prepared our students for the interview process.
- Mr. Christy and Mrs. VanTassel attended SUNY OP Inform and the NYSFAA Financial Aid workshops hosted locally.
- Mrs. Verville continues to run WEB (Where Everyone Belongs) training for peer leaders in gr.8 to assist students transitioning to the middle school. This year 12 new WEB leaders were trained.
- Mrs. Verville provided a Life Skills class for Mr. Fredericks 8:1:1 classroom.
- Mrs. Verville continues to schedule our monthly meetings with Probation for both middle school and high school.
- All counselors, along with Mrs. Tuttle and Mrs. Jeneault, worked with former student,
 Jack Vielhauer, who now attends SLU, in providing high school students classroom

presentation along with informational brochures regarding transgender issues.

OTHER TASKS AND DUTIES PERFORMED:

- Conducted individual senior interviews with parents and students.
- Worked with Ogdensburg Chamber of Commerce selecting a student of the month award.
- Contacted parents of seniors who failed courses each marking period and facilitated contact between staff and parents to help resolve issues leading to failures.
- Contacted parents of students who had missed three consecutive days of school.
- Scheduled and participated in orientation for incoming 7th grade students.
- Monitored weekly reports/progress reports/report cards for students.
- Held annual Junior Night for rising seniors to meet with college Financial Aid and Admissions representatives. We invited bordering districts to attend.
- Held Senior College application night early in September to assist families understanding of the college application process.
- Identified and arranged for 20 female students attend the Women in Engineering day held at SUNY Canton.
- Reviewed all PSAT results with 10th and 11th grade students and set them up to have individualized SAT prep through the College Board and the Khan Academy.
- Served as school liaison with LPP program an early college awareness program available for our students who qualify.
- Managed information for all students in Grades 7-12 who receive Academic Intervention Services.
- Reviewed student schedules to ensure students are meeting graduation requirements.
- Met with students who are academically "at-risk" for failure.
- 10th grade visitation to North West Tech.
- Visited 8th grade Science class for Gr.9-12 guidance orientation.
- Continued to honor parent requests for tutoring on a case by case basis.
- Referred and coordinated all ACCESS-VR interviews.
- Referred students and parents to outside agencies.
- Coordinated continuation of academic coursework, for students who are in institutional settings, for brief periods of time.
- Attended CSE meetings/annual reviews.
- Attend Superintendent formal and informal hearings.
- Attended attendance hearings for students with Mr. Bjork, Assistant Principal.
- All 8th grade students completed a detailed interest inventory and researched jobs based on results.
- Oversaw and coordinated the administration of testing including SAT, ACT, AP, CAT Terra Novas and other state testing.
- Assisted the CSE with process for CSE testing.
- Registered students for Talented Juniors (SLU) and Project Challenge (Clarkson) enrichment programs.

The list above is not a complete list of duties performed but highlights those that are very important.

The College Board recommends that college credit be awarded for a score of 3 or higher however each college may have its own policy regarding the awarding of credit.

We also continue to have students participate in an dual enrollment program offered by SUNY Potsdam (Spanish and French IV) and Paul Smith's (Pre-Calculus and Statistics) and St. Lawrence University (Spanish V). These agreements continue to help our students make a successful transition from high school to college and for many give them the confidence they need to start college knowing they have already successfully completed a college level course.

As mentioned earlier we are looking to possibly expand our offerings with SUNY Canton for the future.

The TASC program was managed by Mr. Christy with assistance from all counselors and administrators. We enrolled a total of 2 students for the year, one of the students transferred to a neighboring district. Our one student did pass the TASC.

With regard to professional development, we continue to have the support of the district to attend many workshops related to our profession. Workshop topics attended this year included:

- 2015-16 NYS Financial Aid School Counselor workshop.
- Attended SUNY Op-Inform hosted at SUNY Plattsburgh. Counselors attended workshops relating to scholarships within the SUNY system, EOP opportunities.
- Our fall staff development day was spent here at OFA with a wonderful presenter who presented a workshop titled "Above and Below the line: the Power of Choice".
- Our spring Staff development Day was also spent here at OFA at a workshop titled "Learned Helplessness".
- Mr. Christy also attended a Northern Zone Counseling workshop, offered during National School Counselors week, that had a variety of presenters, including local EOP/HEOP counselors, giving an update on their admission policies.

In addition to educational advisement the Guidance office continues to provide psychoemotional counseling services to our student population.

Furthermore, issues that we are confronted with on a regular basis include, but are not limited to, self-harm, specifically cutting along with high levels of anxiety, seem to be in the forefront. These instances, along with social anxiety, affect many of our students, who may end in placement at SLPC or on home tutoring. We worked very closely with the education program at SLPC to keep our students on track during their absence. This year was average to above average in terms of numbers of students who were temporarily receiving instruction through SLPC. On another note, we did seem to see an increase in the number of students who were placed on home tutoring, due to anxiety. Other issues include: family problems, divorce and separation, relationship issues, physical and sexual abuse. Hot line calls and PINS referrals were made as situations warranted. While we provide brief treatment to our students and families, probably even more importantly, we serve as a community referral resource.


This year, we again continued to work with a number of students who were afflicted with alcohol, substance abuse, and mental health issues. We saw an increase in the number of students who were placed in our district through the Jefferson County Boys and Girls Home. We continue to conduct conflict-resolution\mediation for our middle school and high school students. These meetings can be especially helpful to administrators in resolving conflict.

Overall, we had a very successful year and look forward to another good year in 2016-17.

Our goals for next year include:

- Update our Guidance home page with more useful and relevant information for families and students.
- Look for opportunities to use Social media more effectively to communicate with students and families.
- Work to develop and maintain a stronger peer tutoring program utilizing National Honor Society and Key Club students.
- Continue to seek programs that will assist our students with transitions to post-secondary education opportunities and how to finance them.
