Film and Fiction Course Proposal - 2023-2024

Rationale: This course would be designed to expose students to a variety of classic and modern literature through film. Students would be required to read excerpts as well as some full length stories and books, both fiction and non-fiction, in addition to watching the films. The focus will be on "reading" film, understanding the text, studying literature through film, and the interrelationships between text and film. The course would be open to 11th and 12th grade students who would meet every day for one semester.

Assignments and Activities: Students will analyze text and film, studying literary terms such as plot development, theme, foreshadowing, setting, mood, character development, symbolism, allusion, the author's purpose, point of view, motivation, and irony. There will also be a focus on background, historical context and vocabulary. Students will examine aspects of film such as casting, staging and dramatic effects. They will also make comparisons between text and film. Students will complete assignments that require reading, writing, listening and speaking. They will work individually and in groups to respond to questions and complete short responses, projects, presentations, and essays.
